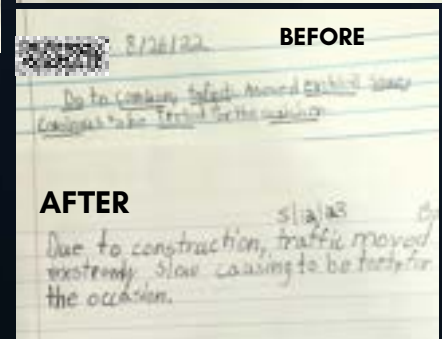
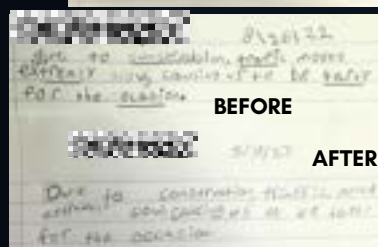
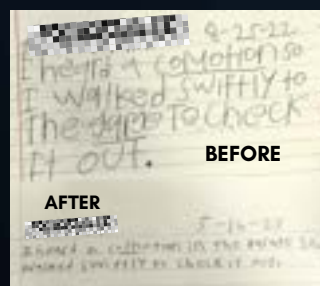

Before DePaul, school was awful. I felt lost. I didn't read very well.

I was always the last one--always needed extra help because I didn't understand. Instead of helping me, teachers just threw work at me, and that made it ten times harder.

Then my mom said, "You're switching schools at the beginning of third grade."

My third grade teacher at DePaul was Ms. Staine (Mrs. McCullough). She made school so much fun that learning wasn't stressful. There was more understanding. I thought, "Okay. I'm not completely dumb."

I made friends easier too—they'd had the same problems I'd had!

Graduation Day was my favorite memory. Ms. Pulito did my hair and makeup. The 8th graders walked together down the hall in our caps and gowns while Ms. Rowley made us laugh with her jokes.

Sitting onstage, seeing my mom cry because she was so proud of me—knowing I made it through—it made me very happy.

Senior year of high school has been fun. Exciting. Stressful. I've narrowed it down to four colleges: Beacon, UNF, FSCJ, or College of Central Florida.

Most of all, I want to be a horse trainer. Most people don't take care of horses very well because they don't understand them. Every horse I take care of is a horse out of danger. I've been around them my whole life, so why not make a career of it? It's my passion.

PROFILE: MICHALE DUDLEY PARENT OF BRENDAN DUDLEY, DEPAUL CLASS OF 2022



I was in shock.

My son Brendan's preschool teacher had just told us he should *repeat Pre-K*.

It was our first sign that something was different. The next few years were full of ups and downs as we tried to figure out how to help him.

We wanted him to repeat kindergarten, but that wasn't allowed. In first grade, his school found a large discrepancy between his reading ability and the things he was capable of explaining and doing.

His psychoeducational testing confirmed he had incredibly high scores in certain areas, but incredibly low ones in reading.

In third grade, we switched him to a school with smaller class sizes. But by middle of fourth grade, he started tanking mentally and academically. His whole self was not okay. He would come home and just shut down.

We heard about DePaul because a friend's son was there. Brendan transitioned to DePaul during his toughest year. That's when the talents and abilities he couldn't express in the regular school system were finally allowed to shine.

DePaul was like a big, warm hug. Everybody just enveloped him in love. He was so excited about safety he felt and how accepting everyone was, from the other children to the teachers to the administration. He didn't have to put on a mask all day long anymore to try to survive.

DePaul helped his soul. He could be himself again.

He did so well that administration informed us it was time for him to transition out of DePaul before he even felt ready.

After that first day at his new school though, he realized he *was* ready. And he was loving it! He's had straight As all year. His teachers say he's relentless—he will do something over and over until he gets 100%.

Now he gets home, does homework, and moves on with his life in good spirits.

We just can't speak highly enough about DePaul.
